# New field marks


Flicker Flashes gets a new look for its seventieth year

We've had a lot of milestones here at Birmingham Audubon lately: the fifth anniversary of our professionalized staff, the fortieth anniversary of our Mountain Workshop, the seventy-first of our organization as a whole, and now... seven decades of *Flicker Flashes*.

To celebrate, we're launching a whole new design—updated, but with all the information you've come to expect from the newsletter. You'll still find updates on the month's field trips, volunteer activities, and natural history events, not to mention the latest news from our staff, committees, and boards—now in a compact, four-page format.

That said, fitting all this information in took some work—especially given that we're about to begin one of our busiest years ever. From new fundraisers, like our August Birds & Brews event at Cahaba Brewing Company, to new programs like the Citizen Science Corps, Birmingham Audubon continues to expand its offerings, both here in the Magic City and beyond. This year, for instance, we're proud to offer eighteen exciting field trips,



Over the years, Russ dedicated countless Labor Days to impromptu field trips in pursuit of southbound migrants, a tradition that continues with this great half-day field trip to Ruffner. Meet up is at 8 a.m. in the main Ruffner Mountain parking lot, located at the far end of 81st Street South. As always, remember to bring plenty of water and snacks, insect repellent, rain gear, sunblock, and seasonally appropriate attire. Full-day trip, Saturday, 23 September, meetup at 7 a.m.

Come along with Birmingham Audubon as we debut a new field trip to the lush woodlands of southwestern Blount County. Begin with a morning of casual birding on the idyllic streets of Blount Springs, a private, 450-acre community about halfway between Birmingham and Cullman; then, after lunch, visit Rickwood Caverns State Park for a birding walk looking for migrating vireos, warblers, and tanagers. Meetup is at 7 a.m. at the Fultondale Chik-Fil-A, located off I-65 (Exit 267) on Walker Chapel Road. Admission to Rickwood Caverns State Park is \$3/ person.
